

34th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Kingdom of the Son

Week by week the Liturgy has been preparing us for the revelation to be made on this, the last Sunday of the Church year.

Jesus, we have been shown, is truly the Chosen One, the Messiah of God, the King of the Jews. Ironically, in today's Gospel we hear these names on the lips of those who don't believe in Him—Israel's rulers, the soldiers, and a criminal dying alongside Him.

They can only see the scandal of a bloodied figure nailed to a cross. They scorn Him in words and gestures foretold in Israel's Scriptures (see Psalm 22:7-9; 69:21-22; Wisdom 2:18-20). If He is truly King, God will rescue Him, they taunt. But He did not come to save Himself, but to save them—and us.

The good thief shows us how we are to accept the salvation He offers us. He confesses his sins, acknowledges he deserves to die for them. And He calls on the name of Jesus, seeking His mercy and forgiveness.

By his faith he is saved. Jesus "remembers" him—as God has always remembered His people, visiting them with His saving deeds, numbering them among His chosen heirs (see Psalm 106:4-5).

By the blood of His cross, Jesus reveals His Kingship—not by saving His life, but by offering it as a ransom for ours. He transfers us to "the Kingdom of His beloved Son," as today's Epistle tells us.

His Kingdom is the Church, the new Jerusalem and House of David that we sing of in today's Psalm.

By their covenant with David in today's First Reading, Israel's tribes are made one "bone and flesh" with their king. By the new covenant made in His blood, Christ becomes one flesh with the people of His Kingdom—the head of His body, the Church (see Ephesians 5:23-32).

We celebrate and renew this covenant in every Eucharist, giving thanks for our redemption, hoping for the day when we too will be with Him in Paradise.



CATECHISM CORNER

The Holy Spirit prepared Mary by his grace. It was fitting that the mother of him in whom "the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily" should herself be "full of grace." She was, by sheer grace, conceived without sin as the most humble of creatures, the most capable of welcoming the inexpressible gift of the Almighty. It was quite correct for the angel Gabriel to greet her as the "Daughter of Zion": "Rejoice." It is the thanksgiving of the whole People of God, and thus of the Church, which Mary in her canticle lifts up to the Father in the Holy Spirit while carrying within her the eternal Son.

Parishioner Profile: Gerry Vaughan

at Sunday mass. Gerry is also on
the committee of Emerald Hill
Mission which, among other
things, supports Open House.

How did you come to this parish? The first time was for 3 months in 1990. Then we moved back permanently in 1998.

The community at St Peter and Paul's is, and always has been, great. One way or another I have been involved in the Open House (and Emerald Hill Mission) since 1998.

But it was when the Capuchins started here that I came back to parish. I just find them really good people.

On Emerald Hill Mission

Emerald Hill Mission (EHM) was born out of the parish, but is not constrained by the parish. It was registered in 1996. When I retired in 2000, Chris Dow got me on the Emerald Hill Mission committee. In 2001 I took over the books and

In 2001 I took over the books and saw the need to build financial stability in order to develop good programs and attract new support.

It's been little steps but we are now better known in the charity giving area. More money is coming by word of mouth.

Rather than handing out money directly to individuals, EHM collaborates to assist in tangible ways. For example:

- EHM pays for a certain amount of food without a \$ limit to be used by the Friars at Open House
- Friday's lunch is still organised by EHM and parish volunteers

 EHM pays for books and uniforms for individual students for all six years of secondary schooling.

The education program has 95% of supported students completing school successfully. The program has grown from one student in 2003, and EHM is aiming for 150 students in 2020.


Funding

FEAST OF THE WEEK

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe 24th of November

The feast of Christ the King is a relatively recent addition to the Western liturgical calendar. It was instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI as an antidote to secularism, a way of life which tends to leave God out of the picture. This feast proclaims, in a striking manner, Christ's loving and supreme reign over all things: from individuals, to families, societies, governments, and galaxies. Despite being a fairly new celebration, its theology has ancient precedence. According to Cyril of Alexandria, "the Word of God, as consubstantial with the Father, has all things in common with him, and therefore has necessarily supreme and absolute dominion over all things created."

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

Entrance Antiphon: The Lord said: I think thoughts of peace and not of affliction. You will call upon me, and I will answer you, and I will lead back your captives from every place.

1st Reading - 2 Samuel 5:1-3

The evolution of the Jewish people had led to the desire to have their own King. David is anointed as the King of Israel. In Jewish history it was important for Jesus as Messiah to be descended from the house of David.

Responsorial Psalm

Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord.

I rejoiced when I hear them say: 'Let us go to God's house. 'And now our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem.

Jerusalem is built as a city strongly compact. It is there that the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord.

For Israel's law it is, there were set the thrones of judgment of the house of David.

2nd Reading - Colossians 1: 12-20

We read from a letter of St. Paul in which he rises to inspired heights in understanding the Kingship of Christ.

Alleluia, alleluia,

Blessed is he who inherits the kingdom of David our Father; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Alleluia.

Gospel – Luke 23:35-43

At the scene of the crucifixion of Jesus, we hear several direct and indirect tributes to the Kingship of Christ. The repentant thief is given promise for his struggling faith.

2nd reading: Romans 13:11-14 Gospel: Matthew 24:37-44
